 - ✓ 8 multi-ethnic sub-districts

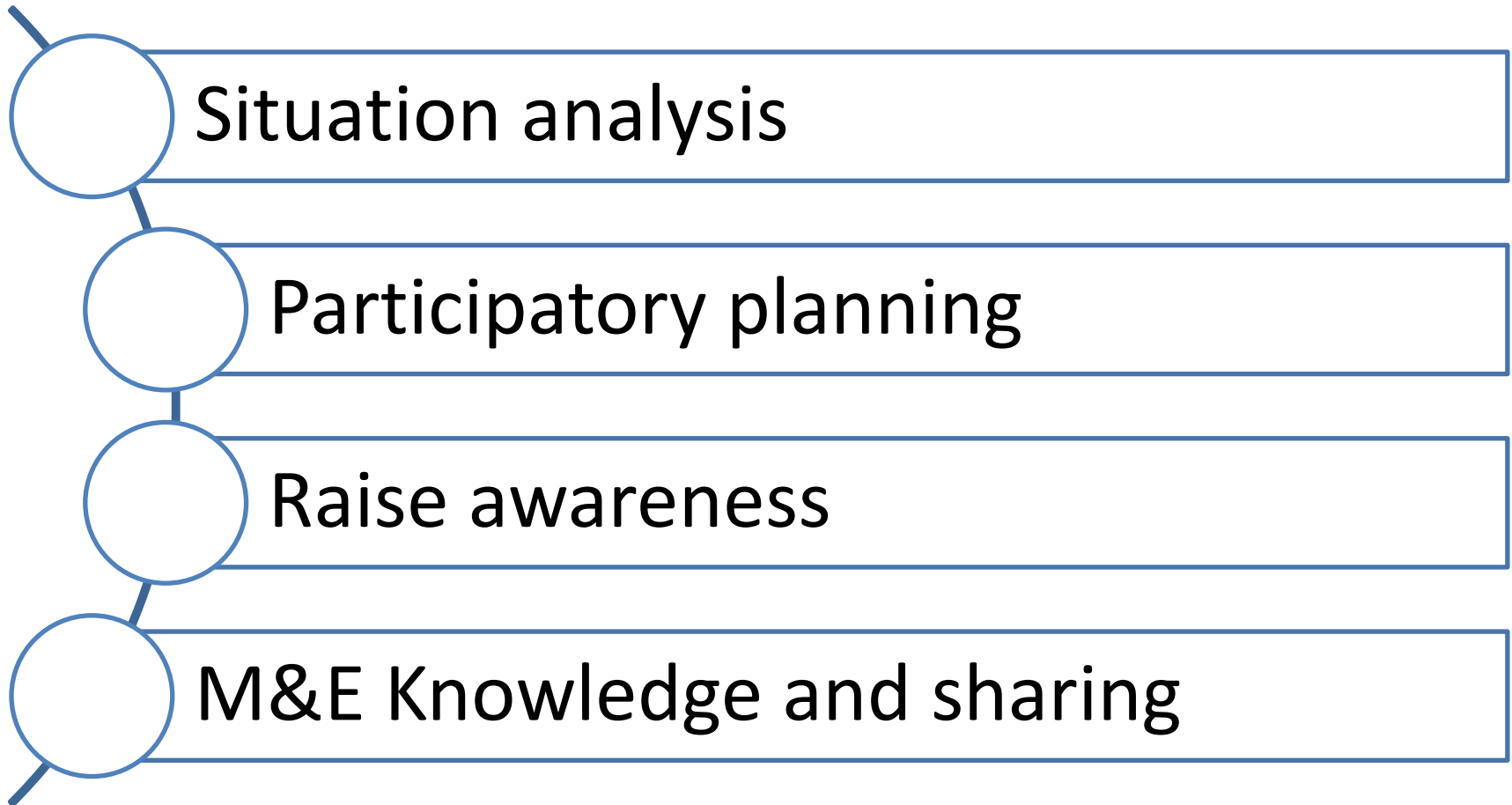
CDD and CDD+

- **Community-Driven Development (CDD)** is approach of empowering local decision-making and putting resources under the direct control of community groups.
- **CDD PLUS (+)** – Creating micro community engagement processes within the CDD framework

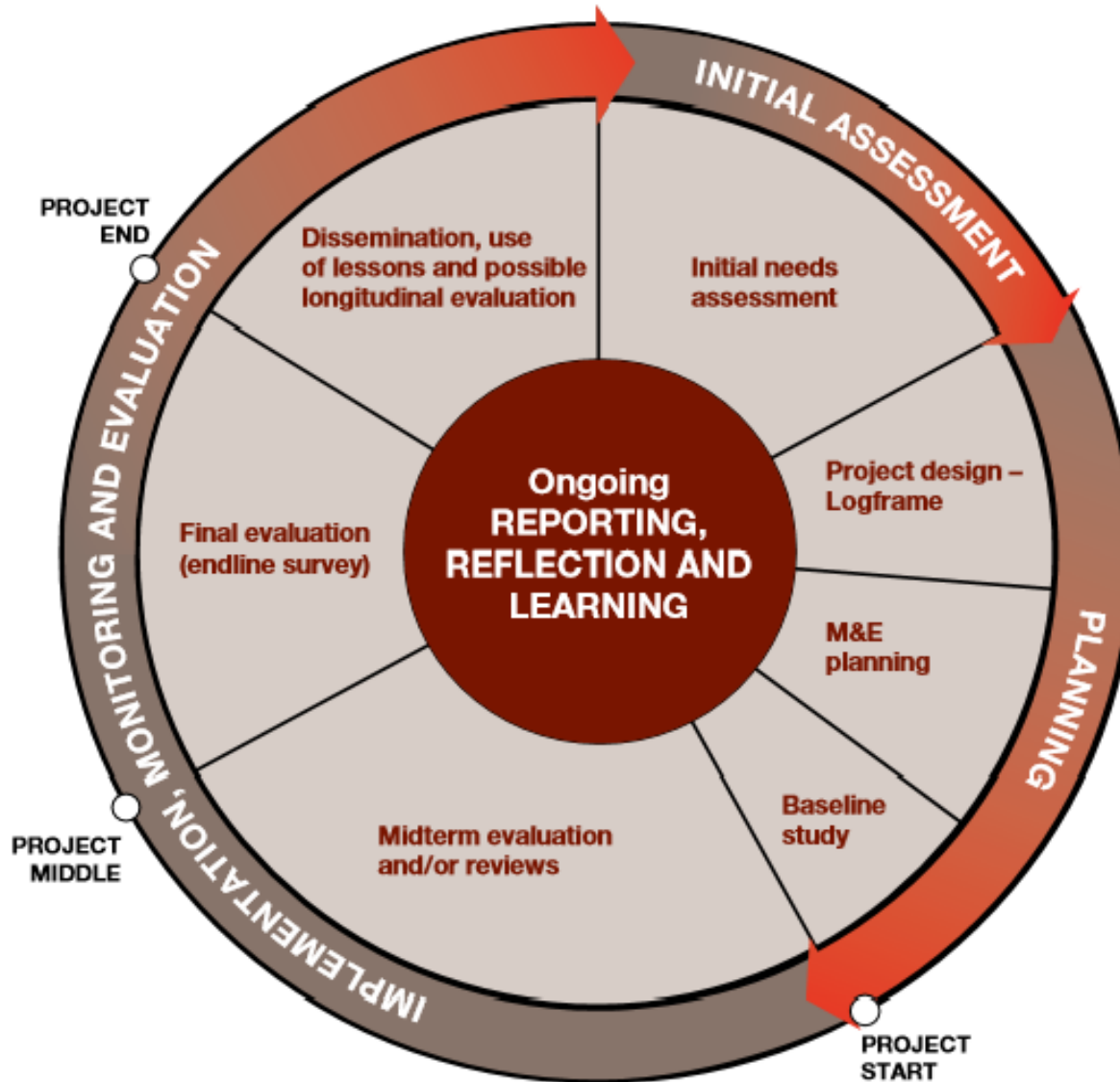

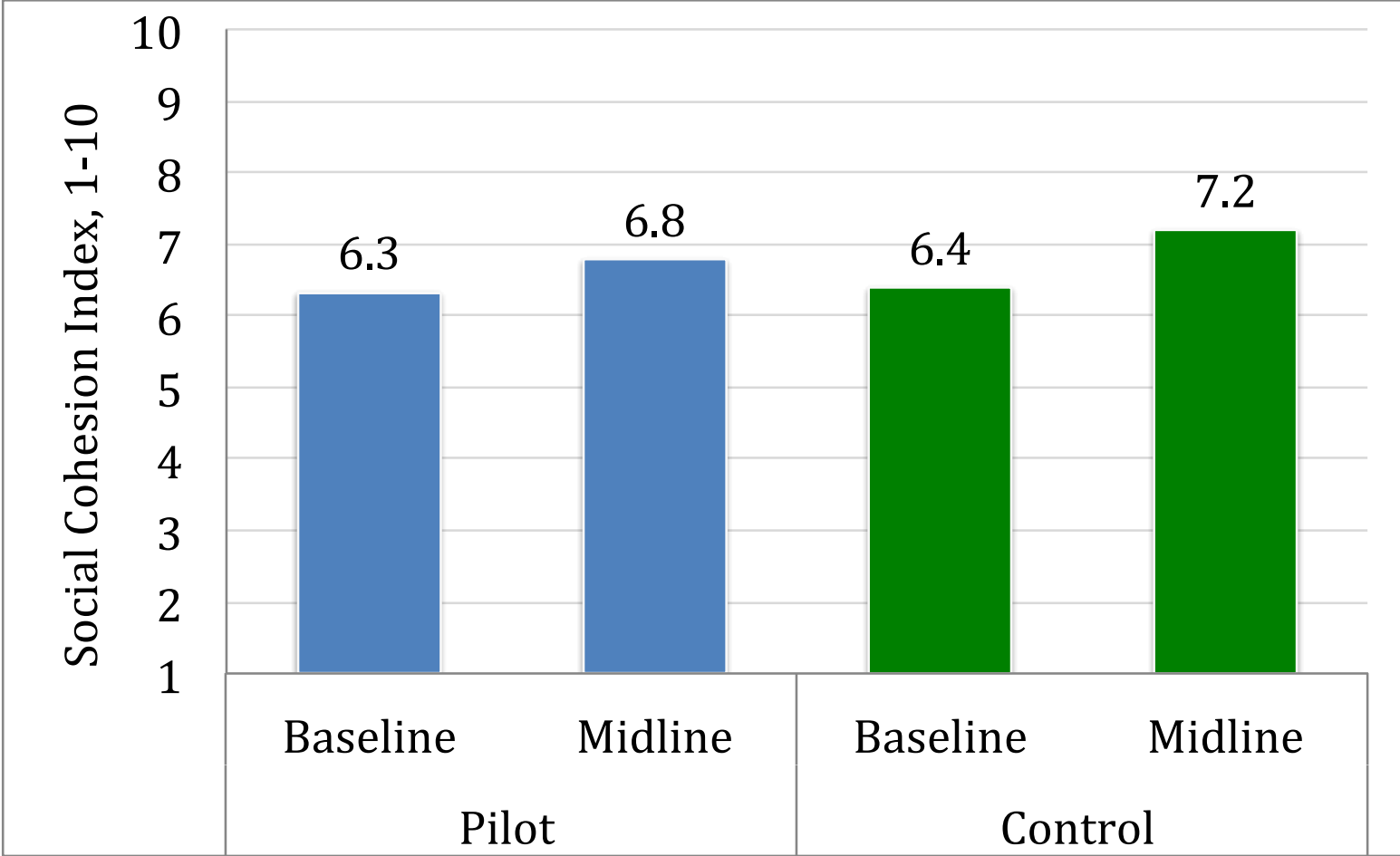

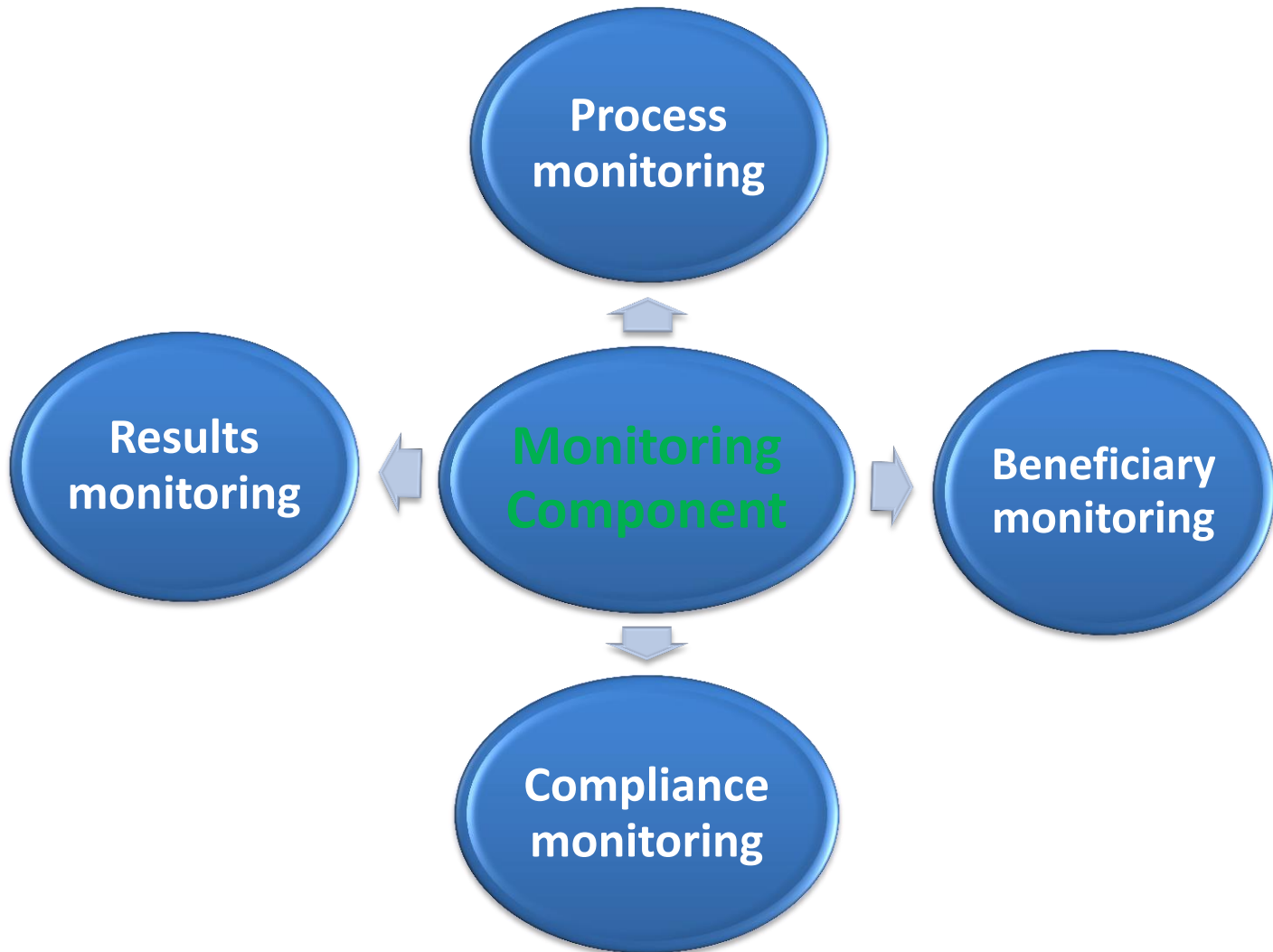

Outputs of the project within CDD+ component

- 140 volunteers trained on conflict mapping
- 44 youth trained on Forum Theatre methods
- 1 Traffic lights established by community members on the results of Forum Theatre
- 394 people trained on Social Audits
- 8 social audits conducted in CDD+ sub-districts
- 8 Monitoring and Evaluation Groups established in CDD+ sub-districts



Conclusion

Activities employed within CDD+ has become a powerful tools which contributed greatly to social cohesion among various population groups and improving the relations between various groups

- ❖ Increased involvement of young people in the live of the local community;
- ❖ Reduced number of conflicts between community members and LG;
- ❖ Increased social interaction and integration of vulnerable children and their parents into the community.
